I don't know about you, but I've been encouraged in recent weeks by the feeling that our country and our church are beginning to emerge from coronavirus pandemic. But here at Calvary, the experience of seeing more and more members of our church family together on Sunday mornings—not to mention having guests with us in worship again—gives me hope that we'll soon be "finding our rhythm" and getting reconnected to each other and to the ministries that allow us to serve both God and our community.

And I hope that trend will continue as more and more of our members get fully vaccinated. However, you know as well as I do that our "Sunday morning rhythm" involves more than just being on the church property. It includes shaking hands, giving hugs, singing hymns, and all of this while not wearing masks!

And that's not because I trust in me (because I'm all too aware of my weaknesses). Nor is it because I trust in you (although I do think that you're awe-some)! So let's "find our rhythm" and discover together where He's leading us now.
