Can you remember times when you've poured out your heart to God in prayer? What were you praying for? How confident did you feel that God would respond? How did God answer your prayer? And was His answer exactly what you were hoping for, or different from what you expected?

Let's face it: Because we pray to a powerful and gracious God who's far wiser than we are, prayer will always remain a bit of a mystery. Sometimes, God gives us "the desires of our hearts," but other times, God answers "No," or "Not yet." Still other times, God responds in ways that are different than or far more far-reaching than we ever could have anticipated. But in all cases, the scriptures assure us that God "is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine" (Eph. 3:20) — especially when we consider God how uses our prayers to contribute to the "Big Story" that He's writing in us and in the world.

During the month of October, Pastor Alex would like us to consider this interplay of prayer and God's Big Story through a series of messages titled, "Immeasurably More." We'll examine a few bold prayers that were offered by

New Homeless Ministry Coming This Winter

Some of you may remember "Room at the Inn"—a ministry that provided overnight shelter for Mount Airy's homeless population during the coldest nights of the winter. This effort was coordinated through First Presbyterian Church with the help of several local congregations (including Calvary). But the pandemic put an end to that ministry, and staffing changes at First Presbyterian have prevented it from relaunching. The need for temporary shelter amid winter's extremes still exists, however. And that's why a new effort is being made by Trinity Episcopal Church and an assortment of other local ministries to try something new.

"The Warming Station" will provide overnight shelter for up to 10 people, beginning on November 1, 2024 and running through February 28, 2025. It will be housed in the fellowship hall at Trinity Episcopal and will only be open on nights that the temperature is slated to drop below 32 degrees. When it is in operation, the shelter will be open from 8 pm to 7 am. And because it's being operated with the support of local law enforcement and EMS officials, it will be resourced in a manner that ensures the safety of clients and volunteers alike.

For the ministry to be effective, a wide range of volunteers will be needed. For each evening the shelter is open, we will be seeking volunteers who can 1) assist with check-in; 2) provide a simple evening meal; 3) spend the night at the shelter to supervise clients; or 4) come early in the morning to assist with check-out and clean-up. Donations will also be needed to provide McDonalds gift cards for clients, so they can get some breakfast in the morning.
